# NATIONAL TRAIL PROJECT AND ADVOCACY HIGHLIGHTS

Below is just a small sampling of new trail projects and mountain bike advocacy work happening across the country, and highlights how IMBA and its chapters help all of us get more and better places to ride!

california: A massive, three-day volunteer effort in late September helped complete the Paradise Royale Trail System in the King Range National Conservation Area. The Redwood Coast Mountain Bike Association, Bureau of Land Management and IMBA Trail Solutions helped complete a 30-mile project started in 2005.

IDAHO: IMBA, Wood River Bicycle Coalition, Outdoor Alliance, Idaho Conservation League and the Sierra Club are making huge strides toward a federal national monument designation for the Boulder White Clouds in Idaho, which will protect the land while maintaining existing mountain bike access to classic, big mountain rides.

NEVADA: IMBA Trail
Solutions has begun to
design and flag 40 miles

# IMBA'S MTB FACULECT SIGNS AGREEMENT WITH U.S. GEOLOGICAL SURVEY

In the coming months, the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) will update trails information for its projects, including printed topographic maps, using data from MTB Project, IMBA's online mountain bike trails resource. Most mapping products in the U.S. are derived from USGS data, and this project will put mountain bike trails in a readily accessible place. It is desirable that the rides in your area are fully mapped on MTB Project to ensure they are documented on USGS and other widely-used maps. Help us showcase, on a national level, how many great rides are out there and the value we riders bring to public lands. The project runs from Nov. 2014 through May 2015. MTB Project, with the help of IMBA chapters and the broader mountain bike community, has mapped more than 30,000 miles of trails since launching In May 2013. A team of IMBA and MTB Project staff have carefully verified and edited all of the featured content, reviewing more than 8,000 trails and rides. IMBA's mapping efforts receive generous sponsorship support from Shimano and PeopleForBikes.

#### IMBA CHAPTERS GUIDING LAND PROTECTION PLAN IN CALIFORNIA

In mid-October, President Obama used his authority under the Antiquities Act to establish 346,177 acres of national forest land in the San Gabriel Mountains in southern California as a national monument, to be managed by the U.S. Forest Service. According to a White House statement, the designation will permanently protect this popular outdoor recreation destination to increase access and outdoor opportunities for the area's residents.

IMBA and its local chapters—the Concerned Off-Road Bicyclists Association (CORBA) and the Mount Wilson Bicycling Association (MWBA)—took a leadership role in partnering with the conservation community to help shape plans for the national monument. The mountain bike groups worked to improve public understanding of the designation, and collaborated with the San Gabriel Mountains Forever group on a co-signed letter to define the characteristics of a bike-friendly national monument, which they delivered to the White House, U.S. Forest Service Chief Thomas Tidwell, Congresswoman Judy Chu of California, and others.

Advocates from MWBA and CORBA, along with IMBA staff, will continue working with the U.S. Forest Service as the management plan for the monument is formulated, seeking to ensure that mountain bike access, which is not

specifically described in the proclamation, will be protected. The chapters are encouraging riders in southern California to join them in making their voices heard as a viable, valuable user group. Visit CORBAMTB, org or MWBA.org for more information.

WHAT IS A NATIONAL MONUMENT? A national monument is a form of federal land protection that the President can designate—without the approval of Congress—via the power of the 1906 Antiquities Act. National monuments can be managed by the National Park Service, U.S. Forest Service, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service or the Bureau of Land Management, all agencies that IMBA partners with regularly. IMBA supports national monument designations because they can protect public lands while still allowing for and enhancing great mountain biking experiences. However, bike access is not always guaranteed, which is why your membership dollars support national advocacy efforts to shape bike-friendly forms of land protection. Without your support, IMBA and our chapters cannot fully engage in the land management process.
